### Tips to save when shopping for your July Fourth barbecue

Barbecues are part and parcel of July Fourth celebrations. Such get-togethers might be even more notable in 2024, when Independence Day falls on a Thursday. That means many people will likely be taking off on Friday, July 5, which adds another day to celebrate with friends and family around the grill this year.

Opportunities to entertain will abound this July, and that can take a toll on hosts' pocketbooks. As the holiday approaches, individuals planning to host a July 4 barbecue can heed these tips to save on food and supplies at the grocery store.

- Ask guests to bring a side and/or beverages. Hot dogs and hamburgers may garner the bulk of the culinary attention at a July 4 barbecue, but side dishes are necessary as well. When inviting guests, ask each to bring a side dish or dessert. Potato salad, mixed greens, pasta salad, chickpea salad, and other cold fare go well with traditional barbecue favorites, and asking guests to bring these along can save hosts substantial amounts of money. If guests can't bring food, ask them to bring beverages like soft drinks, iced tea, beer, or wine.
- Shop ahead. Hot dogs, hamburgers, chicken breasts, and other summer grilling favorites can be frozen and thawed out come the day of the barbecue. Shopping ahead for such items, as well as beverages, can help hosts

spread out the cost of hosting, which can make it easier to manage the cost of throwing a party, particularly if the guest list figures to be sizable.

- Consider less expensive cuts of meat. If steak is on the menu at your Independence Day barbecue, consider purchasing less expensive cuts of meat. The Hearth, Patio & Barbecue Association notes that chuck cuts like flat-iron steaks and petite filets are flavorful cuts that won't cost nearly as much as rib-eyes and New York strip steaks. Hosts also can save on burgers by purchasing ground beef and creating their own patties as opposed to purchasing pre-made hamburgers from their grocer's meat department. The HPBA notes that chicken thighs, legs or quarters also tend to be less expensive than chicken breasts.
- Grill up healthy fare. Vegetables are less expensive than meat and poultry, and there's many ways to prepare veggies over an open flame. Grilled vegetable skewers are flavorful and popular, and guests might appreciate some nutritious fare to counter all the less healthy items they're accustomed to eating at July 4 barbecues.

There's no shortage of ways to save money when celebrating July 4 in the backyard. This year hosts can celebrate to the fullest without breaking the bank.

1 oz simple syrup
34 oz fresh lime juice
5-6 mint leaves

sugar-salt

July is here, and while the heat is cranking up in Tallahassee, that doesn't mean it's time to give up on gardening — in fact, it's just getting good. With our warm, humid climate, North Florida gardeners can keep their hands in the dirt all summer long. The trick is choosing the right heat-loving crops that thrive in our long growing season.

Here's what to plant this month if you want to make the most of your garden during a Tallahassee summer:

### Vegetables that love the heat

If you're starting from seed or transplanting, go for warm-weather crops that don't mind soaking up the sun:

 Okra – Practically made for Florida heat, okra grows fast and tall. Just keep it picked to encourage new pods.

- Southern peas Think blackeyed peas or crowder peas. These are drought-tolerant, hearty, and grow well even in sandy soil.
- Sweet potatoes Now's the time to plant slips. They love the heat and take off once they're established.
- Peppers and eggplant Still time to get these in the ground if you find healthy transplants.
- Cucumbers and squash Quick growers but keep an eye out for squash vine borers and powdery mildew. Morning sun and airflow help.
- Malabar spinach A great summer green that climbs and thrives when other leafy greens bolt.

### Herbs that can take the heat

Summer herbs not only add flavor to your cooking but can also double as pollinator-friendly plants in your garden:

- Basil Keep harvesting it to prevent flowering. Loves sun and makes a great companion to tomatoes.
- Oregano & thyme These Mediterranean herbs like it dry and hot.
   Perfect for raised beds or containers.
- Rosemary Hardy and droughttolerant once established.

 Lemongrass – Adds a tropical vibe and flavor, and even deters mosquitoes.

### Flowers for summer color

Don't forget to add some blooms to brighten your beds and attract pollina-

- Zinnias Easy to grow and great for cutting.
- Marigolds Not only pretty, they can help deter pests.
- Sunflowers A backyard favorite that grows quickly and attracts bees.

 Vinca – Loves sun and tolerates dry spells like a champ.

Water early in the morning to reduce evaporation and fungal issues. You can use mulch to retain moisture and keep roots cool. However, I recently started using bush beans as cover crop instead of mulching.

 Watch for bugs — summer pests like aphids, caterpillars, and squash borers are active now.

So grab your gloves, fill up your watering can, and get planting! June may be hot, but it's also full of opportunity. With the right plants and a little love, your summer garden can thrive right through the Tallahassee heat.

A: It gave me my knowledge of the theater. For the first fifteen years after graduation, I did not work in theater. I gained business experience from the several jobs I had in accounting, finance, and teaching. When I took the job at the theater my mom was so happy that at last all the money spent on college was going to pay off.

### Q: What shows do you have coming up for the remainder of the year?

**A:** On the mainstage, Little Shop of Horrors Mar.27-Apr.13 and Lend Me a Soprano, June 5-22.

In the Studio: Always a Bridesmaid, Aug.8-25 and The Flick May1-18.

Q: You got the rights to the premier of Honey, Sugar, Baby Doll, which was

### quite a coup. Tell us how this came about.

A: We did Savannah Sipping Society by the same playwrights who were visiting Panama City at the time. They called to come by and view the theater. They took a tour and kept in touch. A year or so later they had written Honey, Sugar Baby Doll based on our studio theater for us to perform. They came to 2 opening nights and checked what worked and what didn't and 2 months later produced it. They signed autograph copies for Brian and me which was a huge honor.

### Q: You've done a lot of acting also. Can you think of one or more favorite roles and why they were memorable?

**A:** Steel Magnolias. I was Arnelle and we women all became very close. It was a real bonding experience. I think Wonders of the World was my favorite. Perhaps it was because it was the first I had done after a long hiatus, but we all

formed close relationships and became friends for life. The Other Place was very powerful about early onset dementia. The play affected so many people, and their appreciation of our efforts was heartwarming.

### Q: Where do you find the actors to perform and how do actors find you if they want to perform?

**A:** All our actors are volunteers. Anyone can audition. We advertise on social media, on our website and through e-mail. We send flyers to the universities. Some people have never acted, and some have acted for years. Everyone is welcome.

### Q: What do you like most about your position?

**A:** The people. We have up to 300 volunteers. My favorite part is the first run-through when I welcome them into

the family. The business part could be done anywhere but the people are what makes the theater.

## Q: The Arts have taken a bit of a hit economically lately. What would be your wish for the future of Theatre Tallahassee?

A: I wish people would understand the value of the arts to a community. We have over 14000 attendees a year , many who come from somewhere other than Tallahassee to enjoy what we have to offer. They have an economic impact on the community. People need to know that we strive for quality and excellence in everything we do.

### Q: What do you do to unwind from stress?

**A:** I love cruising. It's a complete escape. I also like going to the theater, hiking, arts and crafts, nature, and photography. If I hadn't been in theater, I would have been a nature photographer.

### Q: Do you think Tater Tot has a theatrical career ahead of him?

**A:** I keep saying he needs to make us some money. He loves to come to the theater because he gets lots of petting and attention. We can't even say the word 'theater' around him because he gets excited and wants to go there. . He loves the attention, but I don't think as a thespian, he would ever obey the director.

### Q: Is there anything you'd like to add that hasn't been covered?

**A:** I just always want to make things better. The theater is my life and family, and this is a way to facilitate bringing joy to others. Some people dread going to work. This is not work to me.

# Plants that can accommodate outdoor living spaces

Plants add aesthetic appeal to any landscape. A pop of plant-produced color here and there can complement any landscape, but homeowners also can use plants to liven up hardscapes as well.

Outdoor living spaces are more than just places to relax. A recent survey from Green Builder Media found that 90 percent of home-

owners consider the outdoor living areas on their properties to be important to their health and wellbeing. That same survey found that four in five homeowners prefer secluded outdoor living spaces that provide privacy. Plants can help fulfill that goal, which might contribute to the greater sense of health and well-being homeowners hope their outdoor living spaces promote. With that in mind, homeowners can consider augmenting their existing spaces with various plants, though it's always vital to consult a local gardening center to ensure plants are capable of thriving in

• Bougainvillea: Bougainvillea are particularly vibrant and colorful, and HGTV notes these popular vines can add privacy to areas like porches. That same benefit can be gleaned when adding bougainvillea to structures like pavilions or gazebos. Bougainvillea require ample sunlight to thrive, so that's something to keep in mind when choosing where to plant.

a given region.

• **Hibiscus:** Hibiscus also produce vibrant colors that can range from red and pink to yellow and orange. Expo-

sure to the sun is considered vital for hibiscus, though precisely how much sunlight is a source of debate. For example, some sources indicate these low-maintenance plants need as much as eight hours of sunlight each day, while others report that as little as two hours of direct sunlight is sufficient.

• Cycads: Cycads are considered tropical plants, so they might not thrive in every region of North America. But these impressive plants, which often can be found in botanical gardens, can help to establish a serene feeling in an outdoor living

space. Cycads can thrive

draining soil and in pots, which can be chosen to complement existing outdoor furnishings. Cycads planted around the perimeter of an outdoor space or even around the perimeter of a patio can be especially appealing.

• Jasmine: Jasmine can add to the aesthetic appeal of structures such as pergolas or trellises. An added benefit to planting jasmine is their aroma, which many find inviting (some may find the scent of jasmine a bit strong, so this benefit depends on personal perspective). For homeowners who enjoy the aroma of jasmine, adding it to an outdoor living space can make the space more welcoming and relaxing.

Plants merit consideration for homeowners looking for ways to make outdoor living spaces more comfortable, relaxing and welcoming.


