Highlight of a Lifetime

Ponte Vedra alumna presents honor to Spike Lee

A Ponte Vedra High School alumna and junior acting student at the Savannah College of Art and Design (SCAD) recently experienced a career highlight, stepping onto the stage to present the Lifetime Achievement Award to legendary filmmaker Spike Lee.

Kaya Heath, a Ponte Vedra resident, was selected to present the award to Lee during the eight-day SCAD Savannah Film Festival. Lee, known for seminal films such as "Malcolm X," "Do The Right Thing," and the Oscar-winning "Blackkklansman," was honored for his three decades of defining work in cinema. Lee attended the festival to screen his most recent film, "Highest To Lowest," which stars Denzel Washington.

The honor reflects Heath's deep connection to Lee's work; she previously interned at his production company, 40

Palencia Elementary 'rocks' birthdays

Palencia Elementary School's PTO has introduced a unique way to celebrate students' birthdays, honor special teachers, or support sports teams by sponsoring one of the school's painted rocks. If a student has an upcoming birthday during the school year, families can consider sponsoring one of the school rocks to have painted in their honor. The option is also available for a student's half-birthday if their birthday falls in the summer months.

The cost to reserve a rock is \$25 for 24 hours. Reservations are managed on a first-come, first-serve basis. Families who wish to extend the time may reserve a maximum of two consecutive days in a 30-day period.

Two rocks are currently available: one located at the front entrance of the school, near the Palencia Park/Village Drive entrance, and the second at the back of the school, at the Kensington/ Las Calinas gate on Regalo Road. Parents are encouraged to sign up for the rock corresponding to the entrance they typically use for drop-offs. Parents who bus

their children may still consider driving them on their birthday so they can see their special creation.

For those who are not artistically inclined, local artists who specialize in rock art are available for hire. The most popular artist is Jessica Bryce, who owns and operates Bryce Brushworks. Bryce has been painting rocks for St. Johns County schools for many years, with pricing starting at \$100, plus potential add-ons

Acres and a Mule Filmworks. Heath is a junior acting student at SCAD, which hosts the largest university-run film festival in the United States.

Q: What are the primary academic achievements and recognitions in St. Johns County schools this semester?

A: The school year is off to a successful start across the district. A major highlight is the district's continued commitment to the Character Counts! program since 1998, which has earned the

exemplary district distinction. In October, several area middle school students were recognized, including Leon Folladori, Shalev Azulay and Leila Agee from Valley Ridge Academy; Connor Broome, Christian Kelly and Keiran Logan from Palm Valley Academy; Georgia Ronay, Camryn Dove and Elizabeth Teplova from Pine Island Academy; and Clarie Bingham, Avery Rose and Jack McLeod from Alice B. Landrum Middle School.

Additionally, several students qualified as National Merit semifinalists, placing in the top 1 percent nationwide on the PSAT. Honorees from Allen D. Nease High School include Paxton Beidle, Manogna Chandra, Nigel Kondabrolu, Logan Kupka, Alecia Lu, Jackson Pentz, Nathan Shah, Chinmay Shandilya, Maggie Yan and Alvin Yuan. The students recognized from Ponte Vedra High School were Star Binyamin, John Chung, Anya Dorairaj, Zoe Epstein, Samuel Evans, Hadley Frey, Matthew Jones, Zane Swierz and Evan Weinroth.

Q: How are St. Johns County schools ensuring positive culture and supporting military families?

A: Schools are focused on creating a positive environment through two key initiatives.

First, military family support is a priority through the Purple Star School program, which includes military liaisons and specialized services to ease transitions. This year, Landrum Middle School earned the Purple

Star designation.

Second, the district promotes positive behavior through the PBIS (Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports) program. Valley Ridge Academy and Palm Valley Academy were honored with the Bronze Star award for successfully implementing the initial tier of the PBIS framework schoolwide.

Q: What community-focused events and communications have taken place recently?

A: Throughout November, schools celebrated veterans with various activities, including musical concerts, veterans breakfasts and flag ceremonies. Additionally, schools organized Thanksgiving food drives to support students and families in the community.

August 11

The 2026 Truth in Millage (TRIM) notice will be mailed on August 11. This exact date changes each year but always occurs during mid-August. The TRIM notice provides property owners with their proposed property taxes for the upcoming tax year before the tax bill is mailed. Property owners have 25 days from the date of the TRIM mailing to request changes to their property value and to also file a petition with the Value Adjustment Board. November 1

Tax bills are mailed to property owners by November 1 by the St. Johns County Tax Collector's Office. Also on this date, tax bills are available to view at www.sjcpa.gov.

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Q&A with St. Johns County Commissioner Krista Joseph District 4

St. Johns County Commissioner Krista Joseph (District 4) is encouraging constituents to stay current on local government activities and understand its procedures.

Q: Can you share a few recent matters the **County Commission** has addressed?

A: The commission has addressed several timely matters recently. Most importantly, the conservation impact fee received a 5-0 vote to move forward with plans to increase it up to 100% over four years. This is significant because it will allow the county to save more trees and walking areas as new homes are built. We also hosted a meeting with Congressman Randy Fine

and promoted a proclamation aimed at preventing harassment within the community. Additionally, the board recently addressed a measure supporting local veterans.

Q: Could you detail the procedure regarding the **County Commission** Chair position, and what happened at the last meeting?

A: The role of the Chair of the County Commission rotates annually among the commissioners, following a defined procedure. The last meeting was my final session as the acting chair. The transition involved a vote by the commission members to select the next chair, ensuring a consistent change in leadership each year.

Q: What is the most effective way for

St. Johns County residents to stay informed about local government activities?

A: Commissioner Joseph encourages constituents to utilize the county's online resources, specifically the official St. Johns County website. She noted this platform serves as the most complete source for tracking legislation, meeting minutes, and the specific initiatives coming before her office.

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John Brown: Harpers Ferry and the spark toward war

Few places in America weave so many layers of history into such a small area as Fredericksburg, Virginia. Nestled along the Rappahannock River between Washington, D.C., and Richmond, the town feels like a living timeline—one where the colonial era, Revolutionary War, Civil War and Civil

Rights movement all left lasting marks. Walking its brick streets, visitors sense the weight of the nation's past amid a lively mix of shops, galleries and cafes.

The Washington family legacy: Fredericksburg proudly calls itself the boyhood home of George Washington. The story begins at Ferry Farm , where George lived from ages 6 to 16. After his father Augustine's death, his mother, Mary Ball Washington, guided the family through lean years, shaping her son's resilience and sense of duty. The reconstructed farmhouse and museum displays reveal what daily colonial life looked like for the future president.

Downtown, the Mary Washington House preserves the home George bought for his mother in 1772. She lived there for the rest of her life, tending her gardens and welcoming visitors, including her famous son. Nearby stands the Rising Sun Tavern, built in 1760 by George's younger brother Charles. Costumed interpreters recreate the atmo-

sphere of an 18th-century tavern, where politics and gossip mingled over tankards of ale.

The family story continues at Kenmore, the Georgian mansion of George's sister Betty Washington Lewis and her husband Fielding Lewis. Fielding sacrificed his fortune to fund supplies for the Revolutionary army,

a powerful reminder of the personal cost of independence. The home dazzles with ornate plaster ceilings and exhibits honoring the enslaved community who maintained it.

Don't miss the Hugh Mercer Apothecary Shop, owned by Washington's friend and fellow patriot Dr. Mercer. The 18thcentury pharmacy displays the remedies of its day including herbs, tinctures and even leeches. The guides offer a fascinating glimpse into colonial medicine.

The Civil War crossroads: If Washington's Fredericksburg represents America's beginning, its battlefields capture the nation's near collapse. the Fredericksburg and Spotsylvania National Military Park encompasses four major battlefields—Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, Wilderness and Spotsylvania Court House—forming one of the country's most extensive Civil War landscapes.

At Marye's Heights, visitors walk the ground where Union troops suffered

staggering losses in December 1862. Chancellorsville, just west of town, saw Gen. Robert E. Lee's audacious victory but also the death of his trusted lieutenant, "Stonewall" Jackson. The 1864 battles of Wilderness and Spotsylvania marked the relentless Union drive toward Richmond under Gen. Ulysses S. Grant. Trails, exhibits and ranger programs bring these harrowing moments to life.

The Civil Rights trail: Fredericksburg's story doesn't end with muskets and monuments. the city also plays a key role on Virginia's U.S. Civil Rights Trail. the Shiloh Baptist Church (Old Site) served as a center of faith and activism for African Americans from the Civil War era through the modern Civil Rights movement.

Modern Fredericksburg: Though steeped in history, Fredericksburg thrives as a vibrant modern community. Its downtown brims with galleries, boutiques and eateries, while farmers' markets, carriage rides and festivals enliven the streets.

A place that holds it all: Fredericksburg is where the American story converges—

where a young George Washington grew under his mother's watchful eye, where patriots risked everything for independence, where a divided nation fought for survival and where freedom continued to advance.

For travelers, it's a chance to stand where so many chapters of the American experience overlap.

If you go: Fredericksburg lies about an hour south of Washington, D.C., via I-95 or Amtrak. Allow at least two days to explore the Washington family homes, nearby battlefields and Civil Rights landmarks.

Get to Know . . . Cindey Nordman

Spend even a few minutes with Cindey Nordman, and her energy fills the room—stylish, lively, confident, and genuinely excited to learn about the people around her. Cindey is a real estate professional, an Army veteran, an artist at heart, and the projects manager for the Ponte Vedra Woman's Club. But ask her what drives her, and she'll tell you plainly: "We were put on this world to meet and love each other."

Cindey has lived in many places—Germany, Iowa, and now Ponte Vedra among them. Her years in the U.S. Army stationed in Germany set the foundation for her love of culture and travel. She attended the Defense Information School for Journalism, Photojournalism, and Public Affairs, covering events both overseas and throughout the United States. After her military service, she studied English Literature at Fontbonne University in St. Louis, later contributing to a book about veterans and writing a book on U.S. Army history.

Travel remains one of her great passions. When she visits a country, she often flies in and then chooses to drive or take a train until she finds

an interesting town. She'll stay for several days, immersing herself in local life—meeting people, exploring small businesses and restaurants, and discovering community spaces that don't appear in guidebooks.

And yet, despite her love of seeing the world, Cindey says Ponte Vedra is one of the few places that tempers her impulse to leave. "It attracts visitors from all over the world," she says, which makes staying put feel just as enriching as exploring.

Cindey's creative spirit

shows up in more than just her photography and writing. Over the years, she has restored between 25 and 30 Victorian homes. She takes care to preserve each home's original character, focusing on "polishing what's already there" rather than replacing it. She also loves wandering through art museums—another way she feeds her artistic side.

As a real estate professional, Cindey approaches her work with the same relationship-centered philosophy that guides her travels. She says she sees her clients more as family than as customers. She shared one example of a young woman who was considering renting in downtown Jacksonville Beach. Cindey encouraged her to purchase a home in Ponte Vedra instead. That move led the woman to meet the young man who lived next door-and eventually, the two married and had two children. Stories like that reaffirm for Cindey that real estate can have

lasting, life-shaping impact.

Cindey serves as project manager for the Ponte Vedra Woman's Club (PVWC), a 501(c)(3) organization run entirely by volunteers. The club raises funds throughout its yearly cycle, distributing scholarships and donations to selected charities each spring. Members also donate needed items throughout the year—everything from holiday gifts for children to school supplies and clothing.

For the June 2024–May 2026 cycle, the club is supporting five local charities:

Cindey says the most impactful work she's done through the club has involved at-risk youth aging out of the foster care system, as well as students at the Florida School for the Deaf and Blind. Being part of the PVWC, she says, allows her to make a tangible difference right in her own community.

Cindey enjoys writing and plans to work on a book centered around a child affected by trauma—another project that blends her creativity with her desire to understand and uplift others.

Ponte Vedra may be just one stop in Cindey Nordman's global journey, but it's a place where all of her paths—military service, art, travel, restoration, and community work—come together. And for the community members who meet her, it's clear she brings a world of experience and a heart for connection to everything she does.

Creek fishing offers winter refuge, scenic beauty Jimmy Tomazini

Hello again and happy holidays. I hope we all have plenty of time to get out to enjoy the water in between the hustle and bustle of the season. It is a beautiful time to be outside.

Lots of the deciduous trees along the creeks are dropping their leaves, allowing us to look far back into the flood plains where deer and turkeys still have some refuge. Birds abound, and the sound of wood ducks fill the air as they spook out of isolated holes and creek bends. This is still a fishing column, but for so many of us, the fish is just what gets us out there to enjoy the natural world, and that's a special thing.

This time of year, there are fewer and fewer reasons to venture out in the main river. Quite frankly, there are a lot fewer fish out there right now. So where do we go then? We go to the creeks — the tributaries of the river where the freshwater fish are in higher concentrations than the main river. They don't mind the cold, and they are beautiful: specks, bluegill, warmouth, bass, pickerel, bowfins, etc. Creek fish are prettier than river fish — that's all I'm going to say.

The two most popular freshwater fish we have are bass and specks. Specks are also called speckled perch or crappie. If you see a boat fishing this time of year, it's

for one or the other most likely.

My bass fishing is far simpler than a lot of folks make it. If I can catch shrimp, I'll take them to creek mouths or sheltered coves in the river where you'd think the bass might stage for spawning in a month or two. If I can't get shrimp, shiners work too. Fish them under floats near lily pads or some other cover. Don't feel that you have to anchor and stay in one spot. If you have a trolling motor, you can slowly troll the baits on the edges to find fish.

Specks can be in various places, from docks in the main river to submerged laydowns far up the creeks. Minnows on slip floats and jigs are the two main methods

for them, which I'll discuss in more detail next month. Until then, get out there and enjoy the scenery and catch a few fish while you're at it. Tight lines.

The Good Earth: Poinsettias are the holiday star of the season

No plant says "holidays" quite like the poinsettia. With its bright, cheerful colors and festive flair, it's no wonder this beautiful plant has become a seasonal favorite in homes, churches and offices alike. But behind its brilliant bracts lies a fascinating story - and a few helpful care tips to keep yours glowing all season long.

The poinsettia (Euphorbia pulcherrima) has deep roots in Mexican tradition, where it was cherished for centuries before making its way to the United States in 1828. We have Joel Roberts Poinsett, the first U.S. ambassador to Mexico, to thank for introducing this iconic plant to American holiday decor.

Think those vibrant red "petals" are flowers? Not quite! The colorful part of the poinsettia is actually its bracts - modified leaves designed by nature to attract pollinators to the plant's tiny yellow flowers nestled at the center. These bracts are what give poinsettias

their signature look, from classic crimson to creamy white and even soft pink or bold purple hues.

To help your poinsettia thrive, place it in bright, indirect light and keep it comfortably warm - ideally between 60 and 70 degrees Fahrenheit. Water only when the top inch of soil feels dry, and be sure the

pot drains well.

Whether you're decorating your mantel, gifting a plant to a friend, or simply bringing a bit of cheer indoors, the poinsettia continues to symbolize the warmth, hope, and beauty of the holiday season.

Happy holidays everyone! Thank you for allowing me to share my love of plants and nature with you every month. I look forward to our adventures next year.


