

The Julington Creek Boat Parade of Lights will illuminate the waters of Julington Creek on Saturday, Dec. 6, at 7 p.m., marking the 37th year of the beloved holiday tradition.

Sponsored by the Julington Creek Prop Club, the annual event invites boat owners to deck their vessels in holiday finery and join the festive flotilla.

"The people along the shores of the creek put on quite a show for us every year," said Julington Creek Prop Club Commodore Bob Ponik in a recent release. "We have people shooting fireworks, parties with live bands, and bonfires. Some have as many as 100 people waving and shouting 'Happy Holidays!' The people on shore have as much fun as the boaters."

Dodd was an Air Force pilot for 22 years and Northwest Airlines pilot for 18 more. He won the Air Force talent contest in 1978 and entertained on layovers in Paris, Rome, London and Frankfurt. He currently performs in the band Shades of Gray as keyboardist and vocalist.

NNSJ offers a variety of activities for St.

Johns County and surrounding area residents including wine socials, golf, book club, walking group, Mah Jongg, card groups, bunco and a weekly golf outing.

"We also have December trips to the Jacksonville Symphony to enjoy a holiday pops concert and annual Red Train ride around St. Augustine to celebrate the holidays and enjoy the fabulous Night of Lights event," said co-president Charlene Lim, adding NNSJ members are also headed to The Alhambra Theatre in January to see "Menopause the Musical."

The parade route begins at the Julington Creek Marina, motors underneath the Route 13 bridge, circles Bulls Bay and continues down Durbin Creek. Spectators can view the parade from the Julington Creek Bridge walkways.

Established in 1988, the event typically features an estimated 40 boats of all shapes, sizes and themes, ranging from 17 to 40 feet in length, all decorated in holiday finery. Some participating boats belong to Prop Club members while others come from all over the area. Homeowners with docks along the route are also invited to participate, as tradition holds that boaters judge the shore displays.

Prizes will be awarded for the best holiday-decorated boats. First place receives a \$300 cash prize, second place receives \$200, and third place receives \$100. All participating boat captains will also receive a Captain's Gift Bag. Prizes

are also awarded for "Best Dock" along the parade route.


Planning for the parade involves considerable organizational prep work. The Prop Club starts in August each year contacting boaters, area merchants and residents, gathering donations for the event.

"Annual dues from Prop Club members provide some of the funds for the Julington Creek Boat Parade of Lights, but we depend on and appreciate many local businesses' and waterfront owners' contributions as well," Ponik said. "Without their help we would not have this event."

The Prop Club is a social organization for past, present and future boaters. Members do not have to own a boat to join. The club meets on the second Saturday of each month at 6 p.m. at the Julington Creek Marina dock. Interested sponsors or boaters can contact Commodore Ponik at commodore@jcpropclub.com.



Mark your calendar: Key 2026 dates for property owners

As we say goodbye to 2025 and welcome 2026, I'd like to share key dates for the upcoming year that are important for St. Johns County property owners to know and add to their calendars.



January 1

All properties are appraised each year as of January 1. The status and condition of a property on this date determines the property's value for the upcoming assessment year.

March 2

For 2026, the deadline to file personal exemptions, including homestead exemption, is March 2. This deadline is always March 1 unless it falls on a weekend, which happens in 2026.

Property owners are eligible to file for personal exemptions for the current tax year if they owned the property as of January 1 of that year. Once a homeowner has applied for homestead exemption, then they do not need to reapply unless there has been a change in marital status, property ownership or title.

Visit www.sjcpa.gov/exemptions to file for exemptions.

April 1

For businesses, the deadline to file a Tangible Personal Property (TPP) return is April 1. TPP is property used in the operation of a business or other income-producing venture, such as machinery, furniture and computers. This return needs to be filed yearly unless a TPP exemption has been approved

and the TPP value is less than \$25,000. Visit www.sjcpa.gov/tangible-personalproperty for additional information.

August 11

The 2026 Truth in Millage (TRIM) notice will be mailed on August 11. This exact date changes each year but always occurs during mid-August. The TRIM notice provides property owners with their proposed property taxes for the upcoming tax year before the tax bill is mailed. Property owners have 25 days from the date of the TRIM mailing to request changes to their property value and to also file a petition with the Value Adjustment Board. Visit www. sjcpa.gov/TRIM for additional information.

November 1


Tax bills are mailed to property owners by November 1 by the St. Johns County Tax Collector's Office. Also on this date, tax bills are available to view at www.sjcpa.gov.

senior leadership team at such an energizing moment for this remarkable organization," said Bolton.



Hello again and happy holidays. I hope we all have plenty of time to get out to enjoy the water in between the hustle and bustle of the season. It is a beautiful time to be outside.

Lots of the deciduous trees along the creeks are dropping their leaves, allowing us to look far back into the flood plains where deer and turkeys still have some refuge. Birds abound, and the sound of wood ducks fill the air as they spook out of isolated holes and creek bends. This is still a fishing column, but for so many of us, the fish is just what gets us out there to enjoy the natural world, and that's a special thing.

This time of year, there are fewer and fewer reasons to venture out in the main river. Quite frankly, there are a lot fewer fish out there right now. So where do we go then? We go to the creeks tributaries of the river where the freshwater fish are in higher concentrations than the main river. They don't mind the cold, and they are beautiful: specks, bluegill, warmouth, bass, pickerel, bowfins, etc. Creek fish are prettier than river fish that's all I'm going to say.

The two most popular freshwater fish we have are bass and specks. Specks are also called speckled perch or crappie. If you see a boat fishing this time of year, it's

shrimp, I'll take them to creek mouths or sheltered coves in the river where you'd think the bass might stage for spawning in a month or two. If I can't get shrimp, shiners work too. Fish them under floats near lily pads

or some other cover. Don't feel that you have to anchor and stay in one spot. If you have a trolling motor, you can slowly troll the baits on the edges to find fish.

Specks can be in various places, from docks in the main river to submerged laydowns far up the creeks. Minnows on slip floats and jigs are the two main methods

for them, which I'll discuss in more detail next month. Until then, get out there and enjoy the scenery and catch a few fish while you're at it. Tight lines.

The Good Earth: Poinsettias are the holiday star of the season

No plant says "holidays" quite like the poinsettia. With its bright, cheerful colors and festive flair, it's no wonder this beautiful plant has become a seasonal favorite in homes, churches and offices alike. But behind its brilliant bracts lies a fascinating story - and a few helpful care tips to keep yours glowing all season long.

The poinsettia (Euphorbia pulcherrima) has deep roots in Mexican tradition, where it was cherished for centuries before making its way to the United States in 1828. We have Joel Roberts Poinsett, the first U.S. ambassador to Mexico, to thank for introducing this iconic plant to American holiday decor.

Think those vibrant rec

"petals" are flowers? Not quite! The colorful part of the poinsettia is actually its bracts - modified leaves designed by nature to attract pollinators to the plant's tiny yellow flowers nestled at the center. These bracts are what give poinsettias their signature look, from classic crimson to creamy white and even soft pink or bold purple hues.

To help your poinsettia thrive, place it in bright, indirect light and keep it comfortably warm - ideally between 60 and 70 degrees Fahrenheit. Water only when the top inch of soil feels dry, and be sure the pot drains well.

Whether you're decorating your mantel, gifting a plant to a friend, or simply bringing a bit of cheer indoors, the poinsettia continues to symbolize the

warmth, hope, and beauty of the holiday season.

John Brown: Harpers Ferry and the spark toward war By Debi Lander

Few places in America weave so many layers of history into such a small area as Fredericksburg, Virginia. Nestled along the Rappahannock River between Washington, D.C., and Richmond, the town feels like a living timeline—one where the colonial era,

and cafes.

Revolutionary War, Civil War and Civil Rights movement all left lasting marks. Walking its brick streets, visitors sense the weight of the nation's past amid a lively mix of shops, galleries

The Washington family legacy: Fredericksburg proudly calls itself the boyhood home of George Washington. The story begins at Ferry Farm, where George lived from ages 6 to 16. After his father Augustine's death, his mother, Mary Ball Washington, guided the family through lean years, shaping her son's resilience and sense of duty. The reconstructed farmhouse and museum displays reveal what daily colonial life looked like for the future president.

Downtown, the Mary Washington House preserves the home George bought for his mother in 1772. She lived there for the rest of her life, tending her gardens and welcoming visitors, including her famous son. Nearby stands the Rising Sun Tavern, built in 1760 by George's younger brother Charles. Costumed interpreters recreate the atmosphere of an 18th-century tavern, where politics and gossip mingled over tankards of ale.

The family story continues at Kenmore, the Georgian mansion of George's sister Betty Washington Lewis and her husband Fielding Lewis. Fielding sacrificed his fortune to fund supplies for the Revolutionary army, a powerful reminder of the personal cost of independence. The home dazzles with ornate plaster ceilings

and exhibits honoring the enslaved community who maintained it.

Don't miss the Hugh Mercer Apothecary Shop, owned by Washington's friend and fellow patriot Dr. Mercer. The 18th-century pharmacy displays the remedies of its day including herbs, tinctures and even leeches. The guides offer a fascinating glimpse into colonial medicine.

The Civil War crossroads: If Washington's Fredericksburg represents America's beginning, its battlefields capture the nation's near collapse. the Fredericksburg and Spotsylvania National Military Park encompasses four major battlefields—Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, Wilderness and Spotsylvania Court House—forming one of the country's most extensive Civil War landscapes.

At Marye's Heights, visitors walk the ground where Union troops suffered staggering losses in December 1862. Chancellorsville, just west of town, saw Gen. Robert E. Lee's audacious victory but also the death of his trusted lieutenant, "Stonewall" Jackson. The 1864 battles of Wilderness and Spotsyl-

vania marked the relentless Union drive toward Richmond under Gen. Ulysses S. Grant. Trails, exhibits and ranger programs bring these harrowing moments to life.

The Civil Rights trail: Fredericksburg's story doesn't end with muskets and monuments. the city also plays a key role on Virginia's U.S. Civil Rights Trail. the Shiloh Baptist Church (Old Site) served as a center of faith and activism for African Americans from the Civil War era through the modern Civil Rights movement.

Modern Fredericksburg: Though steeped in history, Fredericksburg thrives as a vibrant modern community. Its downtown brims with galleries, boutiques and eateries, while farmers' markets, carriage rides and festivals enliven the streets.

A place that holds it all: Fredericksburg is where the American story converges—where a young George Washington grew under his mother's watchful eye, where patriots risked everything for independence, where a divided nation fought

for survival and where freedom continued to advance.

For travelers, it's a chance to stand where so many chapters of the American experience overlap.

If you go: Fredericksburg lies about an hour south of Washington, D.C., via I-95 or Amtrak. Allow at least two days to explore the Washington family homes, nearby battlefields and Civil Rights landmarks.


